THE HISTORY OF HORSFORD SCHOOLS

In 1856 the first school started in Horsford, and this was the old Wesleyan Chapel in School lane. It was converted into a National school for 60 children.

In 1865 a council school was erected with a school house (now incorporated in our Holt Road site), with places for 150 children. The cost of this was £860. The average attendance was 90 pupils. In 1939 when the war started, the school took evacuees.

In 1947 the Church accepted the help of the state and it was officially designated Horsford Voluntary Controlled School.

The centenary was celebrated in 1965, and in 1969 a new two classroom infants' block was built at the rear of our Holt Road site.

In 1973 the first phase of the new Middle School was opened and 120 Horsford pupils of 8 years and over transferred. The new building, with its splendid facilities and specialist areas was completed in 1975 and opened in September with 224 pupils from Horsford, Felthorpe and St Faiths. The original building in Horsford then became Horsford First School.

In 1979 Horsford Middle School had nearly 300 pupils with the 12+ children transferring to Taverham High School.

In 2007, First and Middle Schools within the Norwich area reorganised into Infant and Junior Schools, which meant our Mill Lane site received children from Year 3 and children transferred to Hellesdon High at the end of Year 6.

In September 2012 the governing bodies of both Horsford schools federated.

On 31 August 2015 both schools officially closed and Horsford CE VA Primary opened on 1 September 2015 as part of the Nebula Partnership.

In Autumn 2017, the governing bodies of Horsford, Harnser, White Woman Lane and Old Catton Junior Schools disbanded and a new Nebula governing body for the federation was formed.

On Wednesday 6th June 2018, we celebrated 40 years since the official opening of a school on the Mill Lane site.

One wonders what changes there will be over the next 40 years.
