Racing Goblins ... On your marks, Get set, Go!

Pupils from 17 Norfolk primary schools raced in 25 cars in the county's first ever Formula One-style engineering event on Wednesday, June 7, including pupils from Frettenham Primary, Horsford Primary, Old Catton Junior and White Woman Lane. The children were racing their single-seat electric 'Goblin' cars at Scottow Enterprise Park; the former RAF site was transformed into a children's racetrack for the day and

up to 200 10 and 11-year-olds drove the cars they built at school, with the budding engineers and racing car drivers competing in slaloms, drag and sprint races.

Through participating in this project the children have got hands-on experience of engines in the classroom. They had to both build the car from scratch, design the body and decorate it and then drive it in the races. They also learned how to work as a team, to problem solve, demonstrate and develop leadership skills, and build up their confidence.

Greenpower Education Trust ran the project to spark children's interest in STEM subjects (science, technology, engineering and maths). The trust's chief executive Jeremy Way said: "The project has seen the most rapid growth in Norfolk of anywhere in the UK."

The project is a really innovative way to get children to develop their science and technology skills and as you can see from the pictures, they had a lot of fun doing so.

City Sports - July 2017

Well done to all the children who represented their school and the Nebula partnership at City Sports this year; they were ALL brilliant!

There were twenty two schools who competed in this annual event; the City Sports Event takes place over three days. There is a field event that takes place after school where children compete in the high jump, long jump and throwing events and usually the track events take place over two afternoons; during the first afternoon the heats take place and the second afternoon is when the semi-finals (for the relays) and all the finals take place with the addition of the 800m. However, this year, the second afternoon was a wash out with heavy rain and thunderstorms. This is the first time I have ever known a complete cancellation of the finals and I have been involved or entering for the past 20 years. Let's hope its at least 20 years before it happens again! Throughout the children competed enthusiastically and supported each other.

The committee met straight after the event and decided that they didn't

want a gap in results on the trophies so they came up with a scoring system based on Monday's results and Tuesday's races. This included a weighting for the Field event winners and the quickest children in the heats. All children who qualified for the finals were awarded points.

SkillForce - Awards Ceremony

The schools in our partnership took part in the third SkillForce Awards Ceremony on Thursday 12 July. Year 5 pupils from all our schools were presented with certificates to celebrate their achievements during the programme.

Frettenham Primary, Hainford Primary, Horsford Primary, White Woman Lane Junior School, Old Catton Junior School, St. Faiths' Primary and Drayton Junior School held a joint ceremony in the Birkbeck Hall at The Great Hospital in Norwich.

The awards were presented by Air Commodore Kevin Pellatt FCMI, Chairman of SSAFA Norfolk and 65th master at The Great Hospital, and were given to celebrate the achievements of the pupils who entered into the scheme in September last year.

The SkillForce Junior Prince's Award programme draws on the values and skills of ex-Forces personnel to inspire young people to achieve at school. The programme includes; team-building, problem solving challenges, team sports, outdoor pursuits, first aid and navigation skills.

The Breck Foundation

Lorin LaFave came to the nation's attention in 2014 following the murder of her son, Breck Bednar (14), who was groomed via online gaming platforms and murdered on 17th February 2014. Since Breck's death, Lorin has set up the Breck Foundation to raise awareness on internet safety. We were delighted to welcome her to the Nebula Partnership on 11 July and staff, parents and governors heard her powerful and sometimes harrowing story told in her own words. Lorin also worked with all our Year 6 pupils on Wednesday 12 July at White Woman Lane School. The session was tailored to the needs of the audience, so the content of the talk and vocabulary used was appropriate to the age of our pupils. Through telling Breck's story, she made our children aware of the potential risks on line. She informed them how to keep safe online rather than discourage them from going online at all. Lorin will provide them with the information they need to recognise those giving them false information online by listing the signs they need to look out for, as well as how friends can look out for each other and help eachother.
