got cast as Mary! Christmas is a magical time. Whilst I appreciate Christmas this year is going to be very difficult for many adults due to the current economic climate; for our children Christmas is still just exciting! And it really doesn't really get more exciting than at primary school. We don't need advent calendars - the increasingly louder squeals from the children as excitement mounts as it get days closer to the end of term and the big day is the give-away! Christmas is officially coming

when these things happen ... I. The stage goes up and the preparations begin in anticipation of the Nativity or Christmas production. Then the whirlwind of emotion that happens when finding out the roles for the Nativity or Christmas production. I agree it isn't applications for Drama school but nonetheless it is a tense emotion that invariably triggers both trauma, tantrums and excitement. And of course, there is always the awkward moment when the school realises they have forty pupils vying for nine roles, meaning for example that the whole of reception have to be angels and a few extra roles have to be thrown in; Emma Thompson in 'Love Actually' and her infamous lobster need I say more?

2. Christmas carols begin to be sung in assembly - cue 'Away in a Manger' sung very out of tune, very high pitched and breathily – and that's just the staff! The Christmassy accessories begin to emerge, little Christmas hair bobbles, the teachers who have ear pierced coming in with dangling novelty Christmas puddings, tinsel scarves and the full blown Christmas jumpers being worn on Christmas jumper days.
The tree goes up adorned

with multiple (old and slightly shabby) un-coordinated decorations, and the Christmas Post-box arrives.

It doesn't matter how old you are, it's easy to get swept up in the festivity of the winter season and it is a truly magical time of year to work in school; it always makes me appreciative and grateful for

Salvation Army Christmas Present Appeal 2022 ...

Natalie Brown, our Pastoral Manager, once again this year submitted a request to the Salvation Army to help us provide Toys and Christmas presents to our children and families. This year a request was made to support 81 families and 163 children across our federation of schools. Last year we supported 45 families, including 99 children across our schools and the year before we provided for 23 families with a total of 63 children. Sadly, we can see the significant increases year on year.

All of the families we have nominated will be provided with gifts for the children in the family. Bags and bags and boxes of gifts arrived at White Woman Lane School as the distribution centre ,and then our staff began to task of delivering to all our schools by the last week of term, ready for the staff in each school to distribute to the families. It was very overwhelming and also heart-warming to know that by working with an external agency, we are able to provide families in need with some lovely toys and gifts for the Christmas period. 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Why it is important for children not to miss school ...

All parents want the best for their children and for them to get on well in life. Having a good education is important to ensure that they have the best opportunities in their adult life. They only get one chance at school, and your child's future may be affected by not attending school or alternative provision regularly.

If children do not attend school regularly they may:

- Struggle to keep up with school work. In a busy school day it is difficult for schools to find the extra time to help a child catch up.
- Miss out on the social side of school life. Poor attendance can affect children's ability to make and keep friendships; a vital part of growing up.

Setting good attendance patterns from an early age, from nursery through primary school will also help your child later on in their life. Children who have a poor school attendance record may have less chance of securing a job when they are adults.

Being on time is also vital. Arriving late at school can be very disruptive for your child, their teacher and the other children in the class. Some parents may be finding it difficult to ensure that their child attends school regularly. If this is the case please speak to the Head of School as soon as possible so that the situation can be addressed.

What might the impact of poor attendance be on your child?

In primary schools less than 65% of children achieve good results in English and Maths with an average of 15 days absence a year compared to almost 90% where the average is less than 8 days. Parents can be very surprised at how quickly their children can accumulate 15 days absence within a year.

Research has also shown that children who are not in school can become vulnerable. For example, children who do not attend school regularly are more likely to be drawn into crime than those who do not. If you would like information about attendance procedures, please ask your child's school for an attendance leaflet or look at the policy on the school website.

Attending school every day = 100% attendance

Attending 4½ days a week = 90% attendance = 4 weeks missed per year

Attending 4 days a week = 80% attendance = more than half a term missed per year

Attending 3½ days each week = 70% attendance = more than a quarter of the school year missed.

An average attendance of 80% or less across a child's school career adds up to missing a whole 2 years from school.

Being late for school reduces learning time.

If your child is 5 minutes late every day they will miss three days of learning each year.

If your child is 15 minutes late every day they will miss 2 weeks of learning each year.
